The American Interprofessional Health Collaborative Student Committee is the host for the Student-Led and Engaged Track that features a variety of sessions showcasing the role of students in interprofessional activities, courses and experiential learning in community and practice settings. The track seminar, lightning talks and posters feature student organizations and structures, a student-run care conference, the impact of student teams on outcomes, and the design of a mobile student-led clinical learning environment under the guidance of clinical faculty members. Faculty, students and health professions preceptors will discover many ideas about strategies to incorporate student-led and engaged interprofessional activities in their own settings.

Using experiences and student evaluations from past Nexus Summits and the Collaborating Across Border meeting in Indianapolis, AIHC Student Committee Members will guide and mentor students who participate throughout the summit and hold debriefing learning sessions to answer questions that extend and tailor learning about interprofessional collaboration. This collaborative practice will enrich students' professional portfolio as they enter the ever changing and diverse workforce beyond university. Students will be exposed to the interprofessional dynamics that encompass the overarching umbrella of working within healthcare.
