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Program Highlights:

Integration of palliative care is recommended at the time of a cancer diagnosis. Palliative care, by its very nature, requires interdisciplinary patient-centered care to meet the complex needs of oncology patients. This project will develop a critical mass of competent educators skilled in the development and implementation of IPE for palliative oncology care.

Frequently Asked Questions

Who is eligible?

- Health science educators and clinicians from universities, schools, institutions and programs
- Teams with members representing at least 3 disciplines including chaplaincy, medicine, mental health counseling, nursing, pharmacy, psychology, social work, and other health professions.

What Outcomes Can We Expect from this Training?

 At the completion of this training your team will have a refined, detailed plan to implement interprofessional cancer care education for your learners. This plan will be anchored to learning objectives and tailored for your specific institution.

Is this program for oncology only?

 No, you will have an IPE curriculum applicable and transferable to serious illnesses such as advanced cardiovascular or neurologic diseases. Additionally you will have learning activities applicable to any IPE effort.

How many applicants will be accepted?

Approximately 8-10 teams (40 trainees) will be accepted per year.

What is the cost for the program?

 iPEX is funded by the National Cancer Institute. Airfare (\$500 maximum per person), hotel accommodations, conference meals and materials for the workshop are included.
